- <u>323 Islington St</u>: 2 Black walnut, good condition, removal requested by neighboring resident.
- <u>373 Cutts Ave (across from)</u>: 1 box elder, 1 Black walnut, 2 crabapple, fair-to-good condition. This site will become an Adopt-a-Spot sponsored by the homeowner at 373 Cutts Ave.
- <u>790 McGee Dr</u>: 1 Norway spruce, good condition, removal requested by homeowner. A nearby Norway spruce's roots failed in a recent storm, which is prompting this removal request. (Photos and statement from homeowner included.)
- <u>800 McGee Dr</u>: 3 Norway spruce, fair-to-good condition, removals requested by homeowner. See above.
- <u>199 Clinton Ave</u>: 1 Norway maple, fair condition, removal requested by homeowner. Recent mechanical root damage caused by underground utility work is prompting this removal request. (Photo included.)
- <u>Vaughan Mall</u>: 2 Red oak, poor condition, removal recommended by City. Both trees are showing signs of stress in the form of significant crown dieback and water sprouts. Pruning will only remove immediate hazards but not reverse the decline.
- <u>Alumni Field</u>: 1 Red maple, fair condition, removal recommended by City. This site is being cleaned up for future use as a picnic area. On the backside of the tree there is a significant wound and decayed wood in the trunk. There are other instances of decayed wood attached to significant limbs. (To find tree: park in front of Alumni Field sign, look to the left behind the chain-link fence, and look for the green removal notice.)
